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INTRODUCTION

Highlander and Lafayette Districts have teamed to provide scouts a fun-filled, educational, and safe camporee. The Camporee is open to all registered Scouts BSA and Venturing Units with their leaders. Units are strongly encouraged to invite Webelos to join your unit for the weekend as a recruiting event.

While each District has their own lodging areas, they will come together for all activities to include Campfire Ceremony. Staff from both will serve as volunteers and judges for activities and awards.

Please read this leader's guide in its entirety and be familiar with it before you arrive at Camp. It contains important information that prepares leaders and scouts for the camporee, as well as enable everyone to have a successful weekend.

LEAVE NO TRACE, OUTDOOR CODE, OUTDOOR ETHICS

Camp Reeves is a primitive camp and we will be applying the 7 Principles of Leave No Trace, Outdoor Code, and Outdoor Ethics, as we always do. Prior to your arrival, please review what the Leave No Trace, Outdoor Code, and Outdoor Ethics means to your unit. Apply these principles as you enjoy your weekend at Camp Reeves – pack out everything you carry in, stay on trails, use established fire rings, and respect others around you.

REGISTRATION PROCEDURES

The fee is \$10.00 per camper. A camporee patch is included in the registration fee.

Registration and payments will be accepted at January, February, and March District roundtables or as coordinated with the Camporee Registrar. After completing your unit's registration, print out two copies. Submit one copy as your registration and retain a copy for your records. Checks can only be accepted if made out to: **BSA, Occoneechee Council**.

Registration and Participation Applications are due February 6, 2019

Units can email/mail completed form to Camporee Chief. Units can include payment or a deposit (check only) with their [2019 Spring Camporee Registration Form](#) and [Campfire and Activity Participation Form](#) submission. (Left-click on hyperlink to jump to form or scroll to end of this document.)

The [2019 Spring Camporee Registration Form](#) asks for:

- Your Unit's Country Selection – Units cannot select USA. Country assignments are first to register, first choice!! The first eight to register will have their country flag included in patch. Take careful consideration because Scouts will represent their country with a Heritage Performance (or Presentation) during Activities and Foreign Scouting Brief during Campfire Ceremony.

- Unit or Individual Registration – This is the basic unit information with an estimate on number of attendees (for ordering patches).
- Unit Volunteer – This could be the Adult (Scoutmaster or Adult Volunteer with YPT) and/or Scout (OA member or senior leadership). Please reference the [Volunteer Schedule](#) for a list of volunteer options.

The [Campfire and Activity Participation Form](#) asks for details for both:

- Heritage Performance Demonstrations – Each Unit will represent their country with a brief (5-10 minutes) overview that includes (1) their primary religion and some social customs; (2) Tell what you think the country might be like today if they had always lived alone in your country to which no other groups ever came; (3) Explain the type of relationship your country has with the USA, (4) Explain if their country has a culture within the US and what can be done to be better understand/accept. (5) The demonstration will end with a singing their country's National Anthem, performing a dance, reciting a poem, or telling / acting a story which is traditional to their country.
- Foreign Scouting Brief – During Campfire Ceremony, units will give a brief (5 minutes or less) presentation on what scouting is like in their respective countries. (*Great opportunity for scouts working on their Communications Merit Badge.*)

Payment is due April 5, 2019 (but encouraged with registration)

Units can mail full/partial checks with registration OR pay at check-in (check or cash).

Activity Consent and Annual Health and Medical Record (AB) Forms

Units must bring signed Activity Consent Forms for each participant under the age of 18 (scouts and siblings) and a current Annual Health and Medical Record (parts A&B) for each participant (adults, scouts, and siblings). The Camporee staff must verify at check-in. Unit leaders should keep Medical Forms within easy access in their campsite. If an injury occurs and there is a need to transport the individual to the nearest emergency facility, you will need the forms when you reach admissions.

RULES

Leader and Adult Qualifications

The Camporee will follow the rules of the Guide to Safe Scouting (<https://www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/gss/toc/>).

At least one unit leader must have completed IOLS and be Hazardous Weather trained (<https://www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/alerts/hazardous-weather-training/>). All adult volunteers must be Youth Protection trained. All adults should know and follow the guidelines found in the Guide to Safe Scouting and all scouts must follow the Buddy or Truddy (3 - when necessary) System.

Campfires

NO UNATTENDED FIRES in the campsites. We will follow the *Be Careful with Fire* principle of *Leave No Trace*.

Units can have campfires within the designated fire rings within their campsites. Appropriate fire rings MUST be used and creating other/new fire rings within in the camp and campsites is prohibited. Keep all fires at a reasonable size; never leave a fire unattended and always provide adult supervision for all fires.

Propane stoves, lanterns and Dutch oven tables are permitted. All areas where there are open flames must have two fire buckets; one shovel, one steel rake (part of unit equipment).

No flames in tents.

Do not cut down live trees. Remember to us the 4 D's – dead, downed, dinky and distant (away from campsite) when gathering firewood.

Meals

All meals are the responsibility of respective unit.

Water

Water is available near the campsite. Units provide their own water containers. Remember to carry a water bottle during all activities.

Shared Facilities

Camporee participants camp in designated campsites near other units. There are some permanent facilities: picnic tables, fire ring, and a faucet with running water. No showers. Unless notified otherwise, do not build any fires outside of the designated fire rings.

Porta Johns will be placed throughout the camp. Some are designated for female use only. These are shared facilities by everyone. Please keep them clean and neat. A Scout is Clean. **Do not throw items other than human waste and toilet paper into the Porta Johns.** Intentionally vandalizing them will be grounds for dismissal from the camporee. **Each person will be responsible for bringing their own toilet paper.** A half-roll of toilet paper in a plastic bag should last each person the weekend.

Vehicles

Park vehicles in designated parking areas. Unit trailers may remain in the campsites, but tow vehicles must park in designated areas. ATV's, golf carts, or other similar **vehicles are not permitted at the camporee** unless a medical condition requires the use of a vehicle.

Weapons

In accordance with BSA policy, no personal firearms are permitted at the camporee.

Medical / First Aid

Please remember that Unit Leaders are primarily responsible for first aid and medical care for their participants. If any medical care needs arise which requires something more than basic first aid, medical personnel will be onsite at the Headquarters area. If any medical care needs arise that requires a visit to the hospital, unit leaders must notify and coordinate care with the Camporee Headquarters.

The closest hospitals are Moore County Hospital (155 Memorial Dr, Pinehurst, NC 28374, 910.715.1000) and Pinehurst Emergency Services (300 McCaskill Road, Pinehurst, North Carolina, 28374, 910-295-1298).

Uniforms

Field uniforms (Class A) are to be worn during flag raising/lowering, Campfire Ceremony, and Scouts Own Service. Activity uniforms are to be worn at all other times.

Pets

Pets are not allowed unless they are Service animals.

Rules Violations

The Camporee Chief (in consultation with the Staff) will determine penalties for any violation of the rules. First, there'll be a discussion with Troop Leadership; then a discussion with Troop Leadership and District Leadership. If determined necessary, individual(s) that do not comply must be picked up by parent/guardian and leave the camporee.

Lost and Found

Lost and found items are to be turned into and retrieved from the Camporee Headquarters.

Campfire Program

Units are encouraged to present a Foreign Scouting Presentation for the enjoyment of all at the campfire. They must be pre-approved by the Camporee Chief. Please **submit application to Camp Camporee by February 6, 2019.**

The Order of the Arrow will conduct the OA Recognition Ceremony or recognition ceremony, Arrowmen are encouraged to wear their OA sash for the campfire.

Trash

Trash cans/dumpsters are NOT guaranteed. Your unit should adhere to the Leave No Trace principle of Pack It In, Pack It Out. Bring your own trash/garbage/recycle containers/bags to be carried out with you at the end of the camporee. It is strongly suggested that your unit reduces its garbage output before coming to camp by repackaging food items. Please plan accordingly to dispose of your waste once your unit returns to its home base.

Littering should not happen in the camp at any time. If you see trash, **pick it up** and dispose of it properly when you have an opportunity... but don't throw it in another location for someone else to pick up.

Scout-Led Participation

Units are encouraged to participate throughout the activities to promote leadership development. If there is an area where your unit could lead, please indicate on your registration form. Please reference the [Volunteer Schedule](#) for a list of volunteer options.

Special Unit Equipment

Units are required to ensure that they bring special equipment and supplies for their unit's participation in events.

Trading Post

Each District can set up an OA prepared and operated Trading Post to sell concession.

PROGRAM

The theme of our camporee is 'Around the World.' Units represent their selected country – on the first to register, first choice basis. Saturday's events are planned around those countries selected. (The first eight will be included in the patch!)

Events

1. *Heritage Performance Demonstrations* – Each unit will represent their country with a brief (5-10 minutes) overview that includes (1) their primary religion and some social customs; (2) Tell what you think the country might be like today if they had always lived alone in your country to which no other groups ever came; (3) Explain the type of relationship your country has with the USA, (4) Explain if their country has a culture within the US and what can be done to be better understand/accept. (5) The demonstration will end with a singing their country's National Anthem, performing a dance, reciting a poem, or telling / acting a story which is traditional to their country.
2. *Scout Olympics* – Scout Skills competition with patrols competing in Knot-Tying, Orienteering, Leaf ID, Fire Building Contest, Lashings (this should include 2-3 different types of products that the troops have to make (flag pole, table, raft), Earth Ball (<https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=ZqHB0PjpXnA>) and Relay Race (log cabin pushups, Air Squats, crunches, Firemans Carry, and 100m relay for all members of the team.), First Aid Lane, and Relay Race. **NOTE: THE ACTIVITIES WILL BE UPDATED BASED ON UNIT VOLUNTEERS FEEDBACK COLLECTED DURING REGISTRATION PHASE. THESE ARE INCLUDED AS IDEAS. AN UPDATED LEADERS GUIDE WILL BE PROVIDED.** Units earn points according to the following scale: 40 pts for first place; 35 pts for second; and 30 points for third. 25 points are awarded for participation in each event.
3. *International Dessert* – During break for dinner, Scouts will prepare a dessert from their respective country at their campsite then present at Campfire

Ceremony for judging by Staff. After judging, the desserts will be shared with other units to enjoy during campfire ceremony.

4. *Foreign Scouting Presentations* – During Campfire Ceremony, units will give a brief (5 minutes or less) presentation on what scouting is like in their respective countries. (Great opportunity for scouts working on their Communications Merit Badge.).

American Culture Merit Badge

Participation in Heritage Performance/Presentations and Scouts Own Service will complete the American Culture Merit Badge requirements. Blue cards processing and Merit Badge award should be handled within respective units. Camporee staff will only provide Camporee patches to Scoutmasters for distribution. 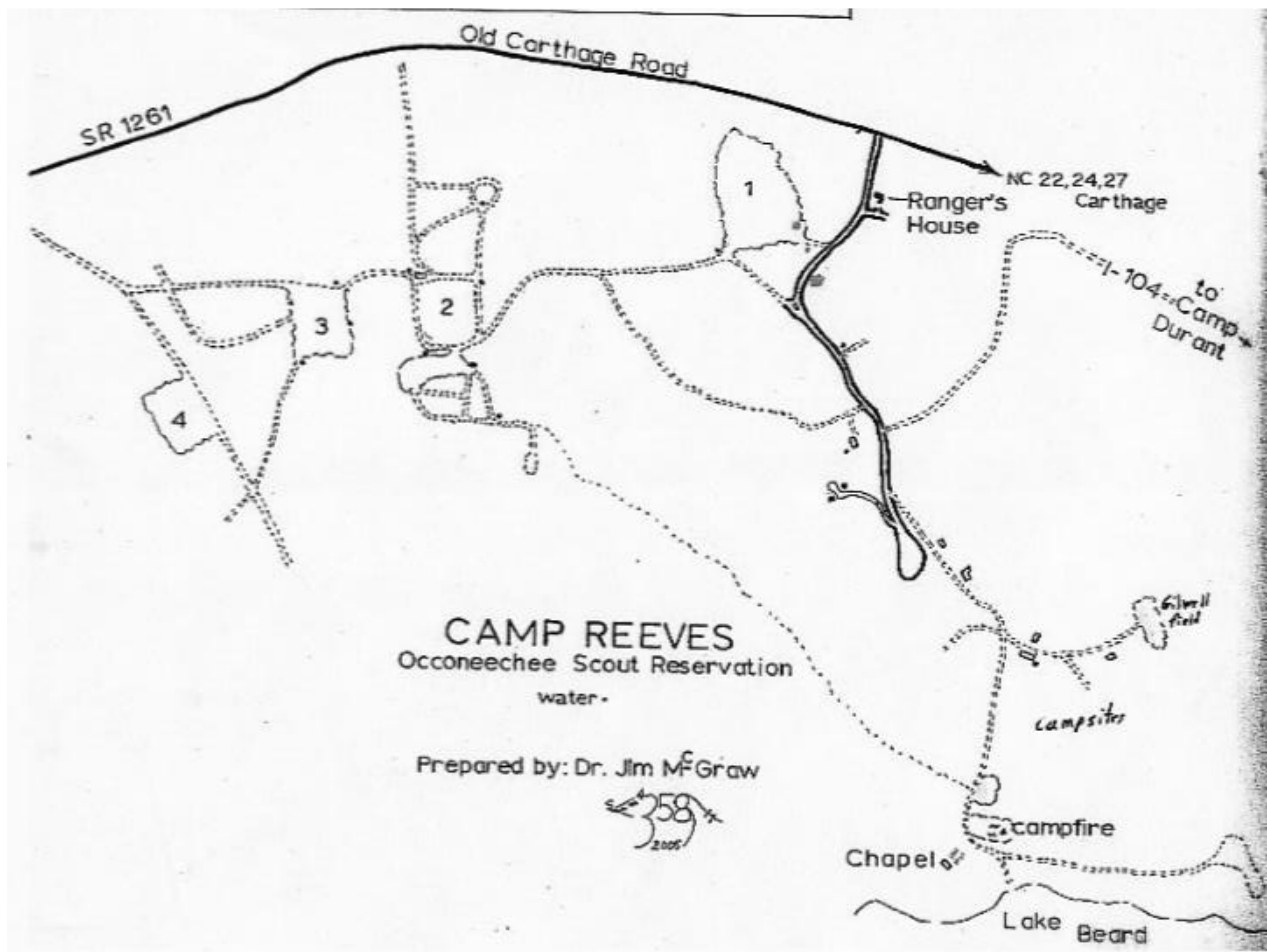

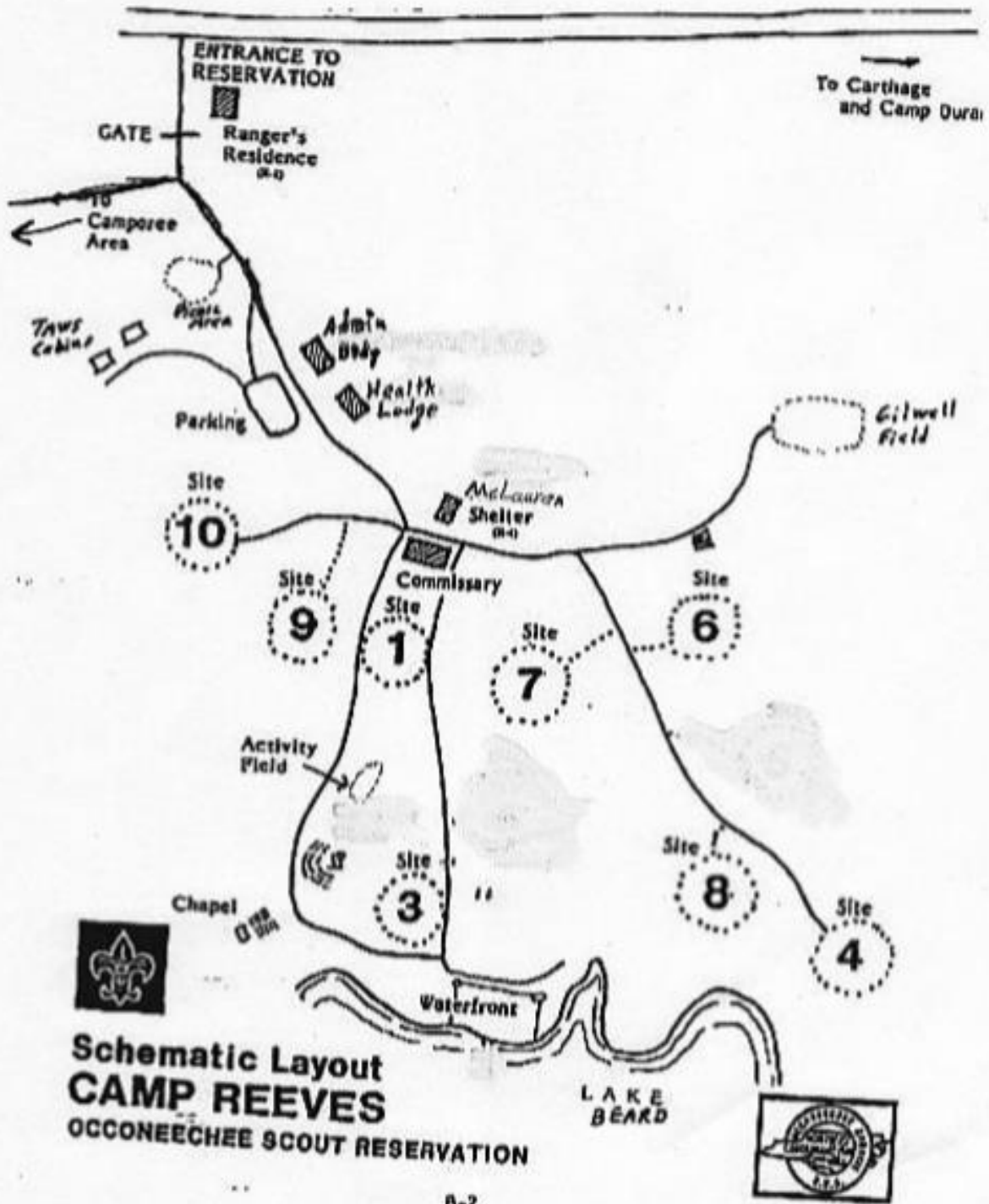
