INTRODUCTION

Highlander and Lafayette Districts have teamed to provide scouts a fun-filled, educational, and safe camporee. The Camporee is open to all registered Scouts BSA and Venturing Units with their leaders. Units are strongly encouraged to invite Webelos to join your unit for the weekend as a recruiting event.

Both districts will lodge on same field due to condition of access roads. Girl troops will neighbor other girl troops but be across from their corresponding Boy troop to enable access to shared trailers/gears. Staff from both will serve as volunteers and judges for activities and awards.

Please read this leader's guide in its entirety and be familiar with it before you arrive at Camp. It contains important information that prepares leaders and scouts for the camporee, as well as enable everyone to have a successful weekend.

LEAVE NO TRACE, OUTDOOR CODE, OUTDOOR ETHICS

Camp Reeves is a primitive camp and we will be applying the 7 Principles of Leave No Trace, Outdoor Code, and Outdoor Ethics, as we always do. Prior to your arrival, please review what the Leave No Trace, Outdoor Code, and Outdoor Ethics means to your unit. Apply these principles as you enjoy your weekend at Camp Reeves – pack out everything you carry in, stay on trails, use established fire rings, and respect others around you.

Further information on Leave No Trace can be found in the Scout Handbook and at on the Occoneechee Outdoor Ethics website at www.ocoutdoorethics.org.

REGISTRATION PROCEDURES

The fee is \$10.00 per camper. A camporee patch is included in the registration fee.

Registration and payments will be accepted at District roundtables or as coordinated with the Camporee Registrar. After completing your unit's registration, print out two copies. Submit one copy as your registration and retain a copy for your records. Checks can only be accepted if made out to: **BSA, Occoneechee Council**.

Payment is due April 5, 2019

Units can mail full/partial checks OR pay at check-in (check or cash).

Activity Consent and Annual Health and Medical Record (AB) Forms

Units must bring signed Activity Consent Forms for each participant under the age of 18 (scouts and siblings) and a current Annual Health and Medical Record (parts A&B) for each participant (adults, scouts, and siblings). The Camporee staff must verify at check-in. Unit leaders should keep Medical Forms within easy access in their campsite. If an injury occurs and there is a need to transport the individual to the nearest emergency facility, you will need the forms when you reach admissions.

PROGRAM

The theme of our camporee is 'Around the World.' Units represent their selected country. (The first eight were included in the patch!)

Events

SPL and ASPL should use the Unit Planner to strategically plan their unit's participation in the race for Gold! To ensure every scout is included, they cannot recycle scouts until every scout has performed/participated.

1. *Heritage Performance Demonstrations* – Each unit will represent their country with a brief (5 minutes) overview that includes: (1) their primary religion and some social customs; (2) Tell what you think the country might be like today if they had always lived alone in your country to which no other groups ever came; (3) Explain the type of relationship your country has with the USA, (4) Explain if their country has a culture within the US and what can be done to be better understand/accept. (5) The demonstration will end with a singing their country's National Anthem, performing a dance, reciting a poem, or telling / acting a story which is traditional to their country. (Score based on coverage of all 5 required points and use of props.)
2. *Scout Olympics* – Units will progress through each activity in a 30-minute rotation, competing in all seven Scout Olympic activities:
 - a. Australia 'Raft Building' – Lash together poles and plastic drums to construct raft. Units will create a 5-man team to represent them. This event is scored by time and meeting specific guidelines to how many bamboo, water containers, and types of knots. These instructions will be released day of the event so teams are at the same advantage.
 - b. Scotland 'Braemar Stone Toss' – Toss 25-pound kettlebells to attain an average distance thrown in three chances. Units will create a 3-man team to represent them. This event is scored by average distance tossed.
 - c. Greece 'Discus Throw' – Flying disc toss dunk game. Units will create a 3-man team to represent them. (This event is scored by number of discs that make it into target baskets.)
 - d. United States 'First Aide Relay' – Team will Splint Scout leg, bandage wound, and carry on stretcher. Units will create a 4-man team to represent them. This event is scored by time.
 - e. Germany 'Orienteering' – Navigate course with points plotted to solve a riddle. Units will create a 5-man team to represent them. This event is scored by correct answer to riddle, time, and accuracy.
 - f. Great Britain 'Human Knot' – Work together to untangle the human knot without letting go of any hands. Units will create a 5-man team to represent them. This event is scored by time)
 - g. Japan 'Kendama' – Scout holds the kendama and pulls the ball upward so that it may either be caught in one of the cups or land with the hole on the spike. Units will create a 4-man team to represent them. This event is scored by number of completed catches.

3. *International Dessert* – During break for dinner, Scouts will prepare a dessert from their respective country at their campsite then present at Campfire Ceremony for judging by Staff. At drop-off Scouts can leave a sample for judging, then take to Campfire Ceremony for sharing with other units during Scouting briefs intermission. (Scored on Staff favorite based on country representation, presentation, taste, and 'hype story' explaining inspiration told during drop-off.)
4. *Foreign Scouting Presentations* – During Campfire Ceremony, units will give a brief (3-5) presentation on what scouting is like in their respective countries. (Scored on presentation.)
5. *Scout Spirit* – The unit with the most scout spirit will be recognized on final morning by receiving the Highlander's Spirit Stick and Lafayette's Kouda Horn! They will retain the Spirit Stick / Kouda Horn until the next camporee. Staff Judges will be observing the unit's representation of the Scout Law, as well as overall spirit. Ways to show spirit include but are not limited to carrying country flag to every event, wearing spirit wear, decorating camp site, and cheering on your unit at every event. The possibilities are endless. PLEASE BRING A SPARE FLAGPOLE FOR YOUR COUNTRY FLAG THAT WILL BE ISSUED TO SPL AT CHECK-IN.

Order of the Arrow



Lodge 104 will recognize Lauchsoheen (Lafayette) and Mimahuak (Highlander) Chapters during the Order of the Arrow Call

Out Ceremony on Saturday evening. They will *recognize those campers - Scouts, and Scouters - who best exemplify the Scout Oath and Law in their daily lives and by such recognition cause other campers to conduct themselves in such manner as to warrant recognition.*

American Culture Merit Badge



Participation/observance of Heritage Performance/Presentations and Scouts Own Service will complete the American Culture Merit Badge requirements. Blue card processing and Merit Badge award should be handled within respective units. (Camporee staff will only provide Camporee patches to Scoutmasters for distribution.) Requirements can be

Communications Merit Badge (Requirement #8)



The Campfire Ceremony and Scouts Own Service provide opportunity to achieve the Communications Merit Badge (Requirement #8). Scout should plan their portion of the program, have approved by their PLC, then present at camporee. Merit badge requirement can be located at <http://www.usscouts.org/usscouts/mb/mb005.asp>.

Messenger of Peace Award

We will be messengers of peace by collecting non-perishable food items to fill a sponsoring organization, Cokesbury United Methodist Church's food bank in Stedman, North Carolina. Units are encouraged to start collecting at weekly meetings prior to camporee. Items can be delivered during check-in.

Any Scout can become a Messenger of Peace if they participate in this project. Together, their efforts will have significant impact on the Cokesbury United Methodist Church's community in the all three dimensions:

1. The personal dimension: harmony, justice, and equality
2. The community dimension: peace as opposed to hostility or violent conflict
3. Relationships between humankind and its environment: security, social and economic welfare, and relationship with the environment



Service Hours

Any youth that volunteers as staff can count time as service hours and will earn a ghost patch (in addition to full color camporee patch).

RULES

Leader and Adult Qualifications

The Camporee will follow the rules of the Guide to Safe Scouting (<https://www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/gss/toc/>).

At least one unit leader must have completed IOLS and be Hazardous Weather trained (<https://www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/alerts/hazardous-weather-training/>). All adult volunteers must be Youth Protection trained. All adults should know and follow the guidelines found in the Guide to Safe Scouting and all scouts must follow the Buddy or Truddy (3 - when necessary) System.

Campfires

NO UNATTENDED FIRES in the campsites. We will follow the *Be Careful with Fire* principle of *Leave No Trace*.

Units can have campfires within the designated fire rings within their campsites. Appropriate fire rings MUST be used and creating other/new fire rings within in the camp and campsites is prohibited. Keep all fires at a reasonable size; never leave a fire unattended and always provide adult supervision for all fires.

Propane stoves, lanterns and Dutch oven tables are permitted. All areas where there are open flames must have two fire buckets; one shovel, one steel rake (part of unit equipment).

No flames in tents.

Do not cut down live trees. Remember to us the 4 D's – dead, downed, dinky and distant (away from campsite) when gathering firewood.

Meals

All meals are the responsibility of respective unit.

Water

Water is available near the campsite. Units provide their own water containers. Remember to carry a water bottle during all activities.

Shared Facilities

Camporee participants camp in designated campsites near other units. There are some permanent facilities: picnic tables, fire ring, and a faucet with running water. No showers. Unless notified otherwise, do not build any fires outside of the designated fire rings.

Porta Johns will be placed throughout the camp. Some are designated for female use only. These are shared facilities by everyone. Please keep them clean and neat. A Scout is Clean. **Do not throw items other than human waste and toilet paper into the Porta Johns.** Intentionally vandalizing them will be grounds for dismissal from the

camporee. **Each person will be responsible for bringing their own toilet paper.** A half-roll of toilet paper in a plastic bag should last each person the weekend.

Vehicles

Park vehicles in designated parking areas. Unit trailers may remain in the campsites, but tow vehicles must park in designated areas. ATV's, golf carts, or other similar **vehicles are not permitted at the camporee** unless a medical condition requires the use of a vehicle.

Early Departures

If any scout needs to depart prior to Sunday dismissal, please advise Friday night at Cracker Barrel so coordinate getting scout from campsite to Camp Reeves entrance for parent pickup. The road into and out of camp may require 4WD.

Weapons

In accordance with BSA policy, no personal firearms are permitted at the camporee.

Medical / First Aid

Please remember that Unit Leaders are primarily responsible for first aid and medical care for their participants. If any medical care needs arise which requires something more than basic first aid, medical personnel will be onsite at the Headquarters area. If any medical care needs arise that requires a visit to the hospital, unit leaders must notify and coordinate care with the Camporee Headquarters.

The closest medical facilities are: Moore County Hospital / Firsthealth of the Carolinas (155 Memorial Dr, Pinehurst, NC 28374, 910.715.1000) for emergency care and Pinehurst Emergency Services (300 McCaskill Road, Pinehurst, North Carolina, 28374, 910-295-1298) for urgent care.

Uniforms

Field uniforms (Class A) are to be worn during flag raising/lowering, Campfire Ceremony, and Scouts Own Service. Activity uniforms are to be worn at all other times.

Pets

Pets are not allowed unless they are Service animals.

Rules Violations

The Camporee Chief (in consultation with the Staff) will determine penalties for any violation of the rules. First, there'll be a discussion with Troop Leadership; then a discussion with Troop Leadership and District Leadership. If determined necessary, individual(s) that do not comply must be picked up by parent/guardian and leave the camporee.

Lost and Found

Lost and found items are to be turned into and retrieved from the Camporee Headquarters.

Campfire Program

Units are encouraged to present a Foreign Scouting Presentation for the enjoyment of all at the campfire. They must be pre-approved by the Camporee Chief.

The Order of the Arrow will conduct the OA Recognition Ceremony or recognition ceremony, Arrowmen are encouraged to wear their OA sash for the campfire.

Feel free to bring lawn chairs.

Trash

Trash cans/dumpsters are NOT guaranteed. Your unit should adhere to the Leave No Trace principle of Pack It In, Pack It Out. Bring your own trash/garbage/recycle containers/bags to be carried out with you at the end of the camporee. It is strongly suggested that your unit reduces its garbage output before coming to camp by repackaging food items. Please plan accordingly to dispose of your waste once your unit returns to its home base.

Littering should not happen in the camp at any time. If you see trash, **pick it up** and dispose of it properly when you have an opportunity... but don't throw it in another location for someone else to pick up.

Scout-Led Participation

Units are encouraged to participate throughout the activities to promote leadership development.

Special Unit Equipment

Units are required to ensure that they bring special equipment and supplies for their unit's participation in events.

Trading Post

OA will host a Trading Post to sell concession. SCOUTS SHOULD BRING CASH FOR TRADING POSTS PURCHASES.

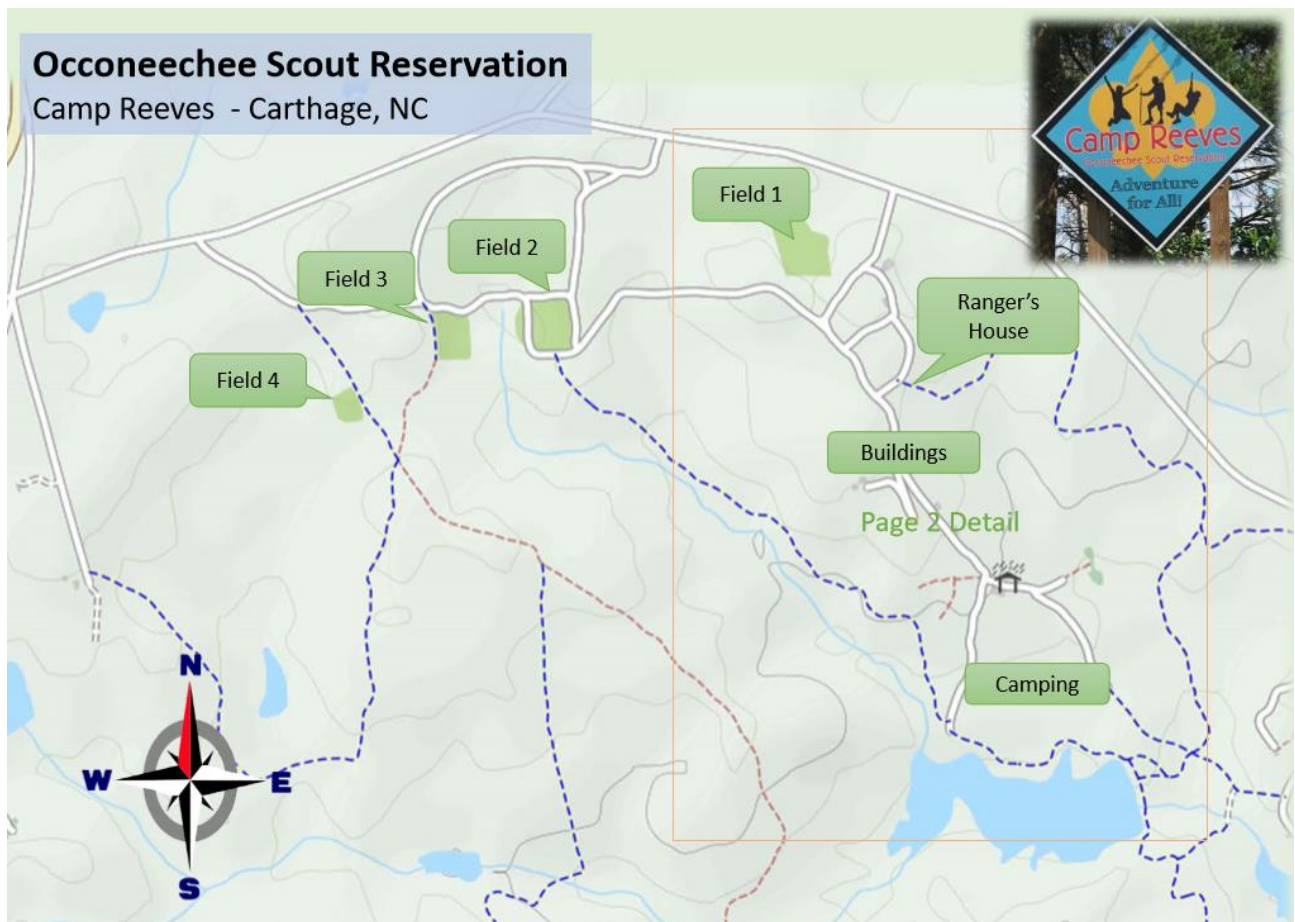
